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Living With Uncommon Sense in a Senseless World

In Jesus Christ, the Creator comes in person to recreate human persons. The Divine One became human flesh. In this uncommon connection, we see one "full of grace and truth" (Jo 1:14). One Who always "does" what God "says". When we believe into Him, we receive "His fullness" (Jo 1:16). And now, the fullness of His Life "may be manifested in our mortal flesh" (II Cor 4:11). All the grace and truth that God has worked into us may be "worked out" (Phil 2:12-13) - we may "conduct ourselves in grace" (II Cor 1:12) and "take every thought captive" to truth (II Cor 10:5). This is how we learn to live with uncommon (holy!) sense in a senseless world.

We manifest grace - God's activity - by faith as we abide in Christ and abandon to His free supply. Realizing the provision God has made for us (II Pet 1:3,4), we begin to believe and come to know that all our needs are met in the gift of His Life. Then we may start looking out for the needs of others - freely giving away what we have freely received (Matt 10:8). Being and doing for others what God is and does for us, rivers of grace find their escape, their release through us (Jo 7:38). Uncommon kindness and compassion (Ro 2:4; Mk 1:41)... how rare is that today? Uncommon edification and encouragement (Ro 12:14; II Cor 12:19; 13:10; Eph 4:19)... how scarce is that in our world? Uncommon service and generosity (Mk 10:45; II Cor 9:6-15; 8:5)... how frequently do you run into that in a self-centered culture? Grace takes away all of our fictitious excuses for self-service which quench the uncommon flow of His Life through us.

We manifest truth - God's "say so" -by faith as we abide in and abandon to His revelation of reality. As we tune into listening for God in the "all things" of life (Eph 5:20) we learn that "below the line" questions have "above the line" answers. As God becomes our Editor-in-Chief, we become more and more divested of "not God". Truth Himself goes to work, setting us free to be uncommon expressions of His character (Ga 5:22-23). We will grow in uncommon deliverance and purity (Ja 1:21-25). We will "grow up" with an uncommon maturity and stability (I Cor 5:58; Eph 4:14-16; II Pet 1:10-12; I Jo 2:12-14). We will grow into someone with uncommon discernment and judgment (Jo 3:21; 7:17,24; Phil 1:9-11). If grace rids us of our fictitious excuses for self service, truth rids us of our fictitious stories about the facts of our life. Full of grace and full of truth, we are being set free to become uncommon manifestations of the One Who is our Source and our Supply. Would that we might become so accustomed, so conditioned, so habituated by the fullness of grace and truth... that it would be unnatural not to live with such uncommon sense!

We have an "anchor for our soul" (Heb 6:19)... a passion for what is possible in the One Who is "both certain and steadfast" -Jesus Christ the Lord. As the Lord of every changing season in our lives, His unchanging supply of grace and truth will never fail. We find all our rhythms for the changeable times and seasons of life in the unchanging One Who never leaves or forsakes us (Heb 13:5).
